### **Permission for Administering First-Aid on Off-Campus Trips**

On the reverse side of this page is a list of over-the-counter medicines and topical (skin) preparations that are included in the first-aid kit which accompanies Arbor staff and students on off-campus trips. In the unlikely event of illness or injury to your child while off-campus (e.g., field/event trips, Medicine Bow trips, camping trips, etc.), Arbor teachers may need to administer first-aid.

Please review the list of over-the-counter medicines and topical preparations on the reverse side. Under each one is a brief description of the reason it might be used. Please place a check by any medicine or topical preparation that you do NOT want Arbor teachers to use or give to your child under any circumstances. By signing below, you agree that for the reasons listed, Arbor teachers may, at their discretion, give your child any medication or topical preparation that is **not** checked.

Check those you do **NOT** want your child to receive or be treated with:

- Acetaminophen: Tylenol**  
Used to relieve minor pain or to bring down fever if greater than 101.5° F
- Activated Charcoal Solution**  
Used after induction of vomiting is completed with syrup of Ipecac in cases of ingestion of poisonous substances; generally would not be used unless prior consultation had been obtained with a local poison control center
- Alcohol Wipes**  
Used to disinfect the skin
- Antiseptic Wipes: Povidone-Iodine (Betadine)**  
Used to disinfect the skin after minor injury such as cuts or scrapes
- Benadryl**  
An antihistamine used to relieve the itching of hives due to poison ivy, bee stings, etc.
- Calamine Lotion**  
Used to ease the itching of hives or a rash due to such things as poison ivy, bee stings, etc.
- Hydrocortisone Cream 1%**  
Used to relieve itching of hives due to poison ivy, bee stings, etc.
- Hydrogen Peroxide**  
Used to cleanse open wounds such as cuts and scrapes
- Ibuprofen: Advil, Motrin**  
Minor pain reliever and anti-inflammatory agent used for minor aches and pains; can also be used to lower fever greater than 101.5° F
- Immodium A.D.**  
Used for diarrhea
- Milk of Magnesia**  
Used for constipation
- Neosporin Ointment**  
Used on minor injuries where there is an opening in the skin such as cuts and scrapes
- Petroleum Jelly (or other lubricant)**  
Used primarily to remove a ring from a swollen injured digit or to extricate a digit or extremity
- Robitussin (liquid)**  
Used for upper respiratory infection with severe coughing
- Saline Solution**  
Used in case of accidental splash into eye or to help remove small particles such as dirt or dust
- Solarcaine Spray**  
Skin spray with a local anesthetic agent that provides relief from severe sunburn
- Sunblock Cream SPF 25 or greater**  
Used to protect skin from sunburn
- Syrup of Ipecac**  
Used to induce vomiting after ingestion of a poisonous plant or other substance; generally would not be given without consulting a local poison control center first
